Tararua College and many of our young people selected for representative levels. Congratulations to them all and a huge thanks to their coaches and managers that support and help them along the way.





8 - Wairarapa Times Age Column: Mayor Tracey Collis

This Wednesday Tararua District Council will consider a report on the Three Waters reform which outlines the questions we intend asking the Department of Internal Affairs.

Our ratepayers own and council operates seven wastewater schemes, seven drinking water schemes and four urban stormwater systems. These assets are valued at \$164 million with a further \$64m of investment identified in our 2021-2031 Long Term Plan. In a recent national survey over 76 per cent of those surveyed were satisfied with our drinking water management, 63 per cent with stormwater and 88 per cent with wastewater.

In a district which is geographically spread, we should be one of the winners in a reform where larger cities subsidise those with smaller ratepayer bases.

However, we were also part of the 1989 amalgamations and know only too well what it is like to fight for our fair share and to be recognised. Each of our towns has not only waited their turn and supported each other through town beautifications, but also through infrastructure renewal and upgrades. We have had to innovate due to our size, partner up to achieve economy and efficiency and attract staff to build our infrastructure team.

My heart goes out to these staff who are experiencing constant uncertainty in their roles, knowing and trusting council as their employer. They have asked me to fight to retain our Three Waters. Many residents have also taken the time to make contact and voice their concerns over issues such as where is our local voice and how will it be heard. They are also asking how we deal with the growth we are experiencing and how would we fare up against the larger towns and cities. They are sceptical of the figures being used by the Government and the assumptions being made over such a long period of time. We know only too well what it feels like to be rural, fighting for roading funding, access to services and housing, with the Government owning no housing in the Tararua District. It is no wonder when we don't have a single emergency house in the Tararua District that there is little trust in Government supplying water during an emergency.

Currently ratepayers are charged \$1242 for our Three Water services which in our Long Term Plan are projected to increase to \$1785 in 2031 compared to the Government's prediction of \$9504 if we opt out of the reform.

In addition to the Three Waters reform, the Government also has other significant reforms underway which will impact on the regulatory and operational cost of the delivery of the Three Waters services. These reforms include freshwater, resource management, climate change and zero carbon, alongside the Future of Local Government review. The sequencing of these reforms matters, but how can we discuss costs when the future regulations are unknown. What happens to our stranded overheads of \$1.2m and how do we deal with this?

Our report from Morrison Low indicated it is likely future costs for Three Waters will increase significantly as a result of meeting new standards and more rigorous compliance. Whether under a new entity or in-house with council, the direction remains the same.

After many years of RMA process, our council have recently received consents for Eketāhuna wastewater (receiving seven years) and Pahiatua (receiving 12 years) at a cost of in excess of \$1m. We agree this needs reform but what this looks like and the costs moving forward are unknown.

The reform adds to the uncertainty for our businesses as the costs are referred to are per household. How does our business community budget and plan going forward with an entity far removed from their local base? How will pricing, fairness and transparency be reflected?

There is also considerable concern in the rural sector as they seek to understand the implications to water supplies.

We have utilised the eight-week period to understand the information and potential options. We look forward to engaging with our communities and as always, making decisions with them for the best interest of the Tararua District now and into the future. It promises to be a robust discussion in council and in our communities as we progress the biggest reform in 30 years.
