- As at 9.30am Monday 24 February 2025, 134 online surveys had been received.
- A snippet of these responses:
 - 67% said Yes to the question "Should there be limits on the number of vehicles allowed at a site at any one time?"
 - 30% said two nights was a fair maximum number of nights stay. 32% said three nights. The rest gave suggestions for alternatives.
- A full analysis will be provided in due course.

1. Recommendation

1.1 That the report from the Strategy and District Development Manager dated 26 February 2025 concerning the Strategy Update be received.

Executive Summary

This report provides updates on key strategic initiatives, including strategy development, central government submissions, and performance reporting improvements. It outlines the review of existing strategies, the exploration of a Council Facilities Strategy to guide land rationalisation, and upcoming legislative changes affecting Council reporting.

2. Strategy

- 2.1 **District Strategy 2050:** Following its adoption, the updated District Strategy 2050 has now been made publicly available on the Council website, ensuring transparency and accessibility for the community. This update reflects the Council's commitment to a structured, long-term strategic approach that aligns with evolving priorities and community needs.
- 2.2 **Strategy Register and Review of Existing Strategies:** A comprehensive strategy register has been established, consolidating existing strategies and mapping their associated actions and objectives. This register serves as a vital tool for tracking progress, ensuring accountability, and identifying any gaps in strategic delivery.

- 2.3 An initial key insight from the register's development is that a number of objectives across various strategies are not currently being met or actioned. As a result, a systematic audit is required to assess:
- 2.3.1 **Alignment with Council Activities:** Identifying whether any ongoing or planned work within Council contributes to strategic goals.
- 2.3.2 **Future Implementation Plans:** Determining whether there are any upcoming plans to deliver on these objectives.
- 2.3.3 **Relevance and Utility of Strategies:** If objectives are not being actively pursued and there are no plans for implementation, the Council must consider whether these strategies remain relevant or should be revised, streamlined, or removed.
- 2.4 Several existing strategies and associated plans require review to ensure their continued relevance and effectiveness, including, but not limited to:
- 2.4.1 **Economic Development Plan** Requires assessment to determine whether its strategic objectives remain aligned with the district's economic landscape and goals.
- 2.4.2 **Visitor and Walk-Cycle Strategy and Action Plan** Needs evaluation to establish whether actions outlined are still relevant or require revision in light of changing council focus areas and financial limitations.
- 2.4.3 **Housing Strategy** Given recent shifts in Council funding, a review should be undertaken to assess whether the strategic objectives outlined in the Housing Strategy remain appropriate and achievable. This review will also evaluate whether further action is required to advance key housing initiatives, ensuring they align with available resources and evolving community needs.
- 2.4.4 Play, Active Recreation, and Sport Strategy A review of this strategy is necessary to determine whether there will be future opportunities to implement its recommendations. Additionally, given the delays in adopting its proposed actions, there is a risk that the strategy could become outdated, leading to unfulfilled objectives and a lack of relevant guidance when opportunities do arise. This review should assess whether updates or refinements are needed to maintain its relevance and applicability.
- 2.4.5 **Civil Defence Plan** The Civil Defence Plan is currently under review; however, there is a need to assess its effectiveness over the past nine years and determine whether it has provided tangible benefits. This evaluation will inform whether a new Civil Defence Plan is required or if an alternative approach would better serve the Council's role in civil defence and emergency management.
- 2.5 This review process will enable the Council to refine its strategic focus, ensuring that efforts are directed toward actionable, high-impact priorities while eliminating outdated or impractical strategies.

- 2.6 **Development of New Strategies to Inform Decision-Making:** Beyond reviewing existing strategies, there is also a need to ensure that strategic priorities effectively guide operational decision-making. One key area requiring a stronger strategic framework is the management of Council facilities and assets, including land rationalisation. A land rationalisation process has already been undertaken to review Council-owned assets, with a report developed to assess their current use and future potential. However, decision-making arising from this review should be guided by strategic priorities to ensure that any actions taken align with broader Council objectives.
- 2.7 To support this, the potential for a Council Facilities Strategy will be explored. This strategy could provide a structured, principle-based framework for managing land and facility assets, helping to guide decisions on whether Council-owned land and facilities should be retained, repurposed, or divested. The framework would aim to align decisions with:
- 2.7.1 Long-term urban planning objectives
- 2.7.2 Economic development goals
- 2.7.3 Community needs and service delivery priorities
- 2.8 By integrating land rationalisation within a broader Council Facilities Strategy, decision-making could become more cohesive, ensuring that property and asset management contribute to well-planned and sustainable outcomes. This approach would also support facilities management, providing clearer direction on how Council assets should be maintained, repurposed, or consolidated to optimise their long-term value and public benefit. Further work will continue to explore how best to embed strategic direction into facilities and land management decisions, with recommendations to be presented for further discussion.

3. Submissions

- 3.1 The following outlines the status of central government legislative submissions, as identified by Taituarā. The submissions are categorised as follows:
- 3.1.1 Final stages of the Parliamentary process (Red): These submissions are nearing completion, and no further input is likely to be accepted.
- 3.1.2 Live for submissions (White): These submissions are currently open for feedback, and Council has the opportunity to provide input.
- 3.1.3 Upcoming (Green): These submissions are expected to open soon, allowing Council to prepare for engagement in advance.

4. Performance Reporting

- 4.1 Efforts are underway to improve performance reporting to enhance staff utility, Council, and public transparency, and compliance with future legislative requirements. A key focus is exploring better methods for collecting community data to inform service delivery more effectively. This work has been ongoing for the past few months and was recently presented to the Executive Leadership Team (ELT) for direction (03/02/2025). Once next steps are determined, an update will be provided on how best to collect and utilise real-time data mechanisms to drive service improvements.
- 4.2 **Future Development of Internal Dashboards for Elected Members:** Looking ahead, there is an opportunity to develop internal dashboards to streamline management reports and present clearer, more accessible data to elected members. These dashboards would aim to ensure that Councillors receive well-structured, easily understandable insights into service levels across the organisation. While this work has not yet commenced, it is a key future goal. As a preparatory step, all performance measures in the reporting dashboard have been updated to reflect changes from the Long-Term Plan (LTP) service performance measures, ensuring that reporting mechanisms align with strategic priorities.
- 4.3 **Future Legislative Changes in Performance Reporting:** Upcoming legislative changes are expected to introduce a more standardised approach to Council performance reporting. Currently, Council reporting is inconsistent across activity groups, making public accountability and performance assessment more challenging. To address this, the System Improvements Bill proposes the following reforms:
- 4.3.1 Establishing a Council performance measurement framework, including regular information releases.
- 4.3.2 Introducing new Council reporting requirements to ensure a consistent and transparent approach.

- 4.4 The Department of Internal Affairs (DIA) is also working on Council performance dashboards, which will be published on the DIA website in 2025 to provide publicly accessible insights into Council operations and service performance.
- 4.5 The following key milestones outline the expected timeline for these reporting changes:
