These people along with other freedom camping homeland traveller's spend collectively big amounts of money in towns throughout NZ, our spend for 2 people as we travel 5 months a year around is avg of \$64 per day. During our travels we need food, fuel, night stays, vehicle warrants, repairs and maintenance of our vehicles, etc. This adds up by the thousands (believed to be around 10,000 per day and spending around \$250 million per year) of freedom camping homeland travelers traveling at any given time, and they are looking for somewhere to stay. The longer

they stay put the more they spend and councils who ignore these travelers lose the income to businesses in those regions that don't accommodate their needs, which doesn't include being told to go stay in a camp as camps don't want their campers to go outside the camp as they want them to spend their money inside the camp grounds, plus any monies spent in camp grounds comes off the available money to spend elsewhere in the region. Freedom camping in NZ is a right of all NZers and whilst we understand it can't be totally open around residential areas it's still a requirement that the councils make areas of pleasurable and scenic value available to csc freedom camping travelers. There are many retired persons using larger motorhomes now as these are easy to move, and spend time in, but are not suitable for carparks, so require larger areas to park in. Most travelers prefer 3 night stays as this allows time to arrive then spend a couple of days visiting and shopping in the areas around the district, 2 days doesn't do this as it's forcing people to move on quickly with no time to relax and enjoy their stay. Due to this, many don't visit districts that have these, and more, restrictions like Auckland, Queenstown, and Wanaka as examples. In closing councils have a duty to their businesses who pay rates to help make their region a place where people want to visit and spend money, therefore by not suppling guality and guantity freedom camping areas to accommodate the real needs for these travelers they are failing their business rate payers. Each traveler the council turns away from their region is a part loss in a \$250 million plus retail trade spent just by these travelers. Please consider as open a policy as possible for all concerned. Thank you for your time.

Subject: Objection to Proposed Freedom Camping Bylaw – Akitio Beach

Dear Chief Executive,

I am writing to formally raise my objection to the proposed bylaw that would permit freedom camping, including tents and selfcontained vehicles, for up to five nights at Akitio Beach.

A stay of five nights is excessive and unsustainable for a small coastal settlement like Akitio. The existing infrastructure – particularly in terms of waste disposal, sanitation, and water supply – is not equipped to handle extended stays by a large number of visitors. Encouraging longer visits without proper facilities will put unnecessary pressure on our fragile environment.

Our community has already seen the consequences of unmanaged camping. There have been instances of unacceptable behaviour, including the use of foreshore/grassed area and nearby bush areas as toilets, littering, and campfires during prohibited periods. On one occasion, I witnessed an open fire during a fire ban that posed a serious hazard to nearby properties. When concerns were raised, the response from campers was confrontational and threatening, they were even advised that there was only 1 volunteer fireperson on duty as the rest were away from the area, that didn't seem to concern them and they continued with the fire.

Even in cases involving self-contained vehicles, the impacts are noticeable. We regularly find rubbish left behind, and the natural beauty of the area is compromised. The current informal limit of two nights has generally kept these issues manageable – but extending this to five nights will significantly increase the strain on our community and environment.

Furthermore, Akitio already has a designated campground at the southern end of the beach. The foreshore has traditionally been used for day visitors and local recreation – not overnight camping. This proposal risks changing the character of the area and keeping it accessible for everybody to enjoy.

Equally concerning is the apparent lack of proactive engagement with Akitio residents. This proposal has been quietly advanced without proper consultation, particularly at a time of year when fewer residents are available to participate. Genuine, transparent dialogue with the community is essential when considering a change that will significantly affect local quality of life and the environment.

I respectfully request that the Council reconsider the length of time they are proposing for these stays or halts this process and initiates formal consultation with the Akitio community. A properly advertised public meeting should be held, allowing local voices to be heard before any decisions are finalised.

Dear Sir/Madam,

I am writing to register my strong objection to the proposed freedom camping plan, which would permit both tents and self-contained vehicles to remain at Akitio Beach for up to five nights.

I do not reside in Akitio Beach; however, I have an interest in the community and share in the expenses related to the property situated at

Allowing extended camping at this location is impractical and potentially harmful. Akitio Beach does not possess the necessary infrastructure—adequate water supply, waste disposal, or toilet facilities—to support an influx of campers for such a length of time. Additionally, there is no local police presence to help monitor or manage potential incidents, as any law enforcement assistance must come from Dannevirke—a significant distance away. This situation poses significant environmental, health, and safety risks not only for the local community but also for visitors.

Our community has already experienced disturbing incidents involving freedom campers. These include, but are not limited to, public defecation witnessed by local families and a blatant disregard for fire bans. I am aware that some members of our

community have even been threatened when they asked campers to comply with fire bans and other regulations. Such behaviour endangers everyone and undermines the values of respect and safety that we strive to uphold.

While it is acknowledged that most self-contained vehicles cause fewer issues than tent campers, even the existing informal expectation of a two-night stay has sometimes left us with unpleasant odours, litter, and waste. Extending the permitted stay to five nights is likely to exacerbate these problems considerably.

Furthermore, there is already a designated camping ground at the southern end of Akitio Beach. Historically, the foreshore has never been intended for overnight camping, only for day use. Converting it into a freedom camping area for extended stays dishonours the original intention of this community resource and risks significant environmental damage.

It is also important to highlight that nowhere else in the world is it possible to camp for free. In most countries, camping—whether in a tent or a vehicle—comes with a fee that supports maintenance, infrastructure, and the protection of local communities and environments. Those who wish to camp here should contribute financially towards the upkeep and management of the area. Allowing free camping is not only unsustainable but places an unfair burden on local ratepayers and residents. Free camping is also an issue throughout New Zealand, where many visitors do not respect the environment, largely because the supporting infrastructure is not in place to manage such use.

What is also troubling is the manner in which this proposal has been introduced. To date, there has been no meaningful consultation with local residents and ratepayers. It appears that the proposal is being advanced during the quieter winter months, when many residents are away. This approach undermines transparency and trust in the Council's decision-making process.

I therefore urge the Council to reconsider this proposal. I also request that a properly notified meeting be held with the Akitio community to ensure that our voices are heard before any decisions are finalised. The wellbeing of our community and environment must not be compromised by this ill-considered plan.

SUBMISSION ON DRAFT FREEDOM CAMPING BYLAW 2025

INTRODUCTION

The Tararua province of Federated Farmers appreciates the opportunity to comment on the Draft Freedom Camping Bylaw 2025.

Most farmers have a story to tell about freedom campers. Their experiences range from humanwaste and rubbish being deposited near their yards, houses, driveways, or roadside paddocks; Fires being lit despite fire bans; Dogs straying and hassling stock and wildlife, vehicles blocking gates or interfering with stock movement, visitors asking for directions or help, farm dogs rolling in human waste, noise and anti-social behaviour, and trespass related safety issues.

In Tararua, our members share boundaries with freedom camping sites and are directly affected by this bylaw. The farms in question are multi-generational and the families have long memories and experiences of living alongside freedom campers. They are well placed to speak authoritatively about freedom camping issues and enforcement at these sites. This submission is informed by their collective wisdom. Federated Farmers also supports any individual submissions they may make.

Federated Farmers seeks to find a way for Council to appropriately manage freedom camping issues within the legal framework it must operate. We acknowledge the summer camping legacy issues the Council must contend with. We also acknowledge that tourism remains an important economic contributor to the Tararua region. We appreciate that freedom camping provides tourists an opportunity to connect with rural New Zealand in ways that commercial campgrounds may not. To protect neighbouring properties and ensure Tararua is a holiday-friendly region for different budgets, freedom camping rules must be easy to follow, the sites well-managed and the bylaw must be properly enforced.

There are discussions going on at both national and regional levels about the future of tourism in New Zealand and what sustainable tourism means. We have arguably reached a time when user pays principles must apply to freedom camping so that we can better protect our environment, especially the treasured coastal areas managed by cash strapped councils such as Tararua's.

GENERAL SUBMISSIONS

Federated Farmers understands that one of the aims of this bylaw is to standardise and simplify the rules around freedom camping. In our view, the bylaw is still confusing; It has two different schedules of restricted areas, and leaves all other areas open to freedom campers.

Federated Farmers supports the move to self-contained vehicles, limitations on duration of stay and the use of semi-permanent structures.

Ultimately, the success of the draft Freedom Camping Bylaw 2025 will depend on how well it is enforced. The Council expects the bylaw to increase infringement revenue. Time will tell whether this is achievable. Federated Farmers is concerned that Council will lack the funds to properly maintain and enforce the activities.

PROHIBITED AND RESTRICTED AREAS

Federated Farmers generally supports the draft Freedom Camping Bylaw 2025 including prohibited and restricted freedom camping areas. However, we are concerned that prohibiting/restricting freedom camping in the urban settlement areas and surrounds will inevitably result in more freedom campers moving out towards rural areas, which by their very nature are more difficult to monitor and enforce.

We are particularly concerned about where restricted areas are situated within rural localities, and the grey areas surrounding how far 'restrictions' take effect in these areas, particularly where farmers may suddenly have to deal with itinerant campers littering or obstructing access around private property.

We think the policy could benefit from an addition to the bylaw requirement preventing freedom camping in any public road or byway within 10km of a restricted area.

DURATION OF STAY

Federated Farmers supports the 5 day limit in any consecutive 30 days, but it needs to be well enforced.

CONCLUSION

The Tararua province of Federated Farmers appreciates the opportunity to submit on the Draft Freedom Camping Bylaw 2025.

	that lacks the infrastructure and resources to support such an influx of campers. Akitio does not have adequate water supply, waste management, or toilet facilities to cope with prolonged stays by non-self- contained campers. This creates not only environmental concerns but also serious health and safety issues for both locals and visitors. In recent years, we have experienced unacceptable behaviour from some freedom campers, including public defecation in front of our children and blatant disregard for fire bans. I was personally threatened by campers who lit an open fire during a ban and became aggressive when asked to extinguish it. This type of behaviour is not only distressing but dangerous, especially in a community so reliant on everyone obeying safety rulings.

OTHER COMMENTS	Any freedom camping should be entirely restricted to self contained vehicles as it is across most of NZ. With respect it is generally the non-self contained campers who pose the most problem. As rate payers why should we foot the bill for their holiday and feel threatened and uncomfortable in our holiday place where we have worked so hard to keep and maintain.

OTHER COMMENTS	Generally non-self contained vehicles are respectful and tidy, they do respect the bylaws and notices and the locals too. Ultimately if you allow non-self contained vehicles you are going to place a significant burden on the local rate payers, at a time when rates are rising exponentially why should the increase burden be placed on the ratepayer. The NZ government acknowledged this issue in 2023 with the amendments to the freedom camping laws

	to protect the environment and the local ratepayers, the looseness your proposal is in defiance of the effort they were making to protect us all.

OTHER COMMENTS	At the end of the day as a council it is your job to protect your environment and your ratepayers, the people who pay your salaries. You also need to so prudent management of the books so minimising risks is what you should be doing. This proposal poses both environmental public health/safety issues so to keep a happy medium the proposal should only be applicable to self contained vehicles entirely. Remember, enforcement is often limited by resources and this will be an issue at peak season again posing another expense to an already stretched resource.
7. DO YOU THINK WE SHOULD HAVE OTHER PROHIBITIONS (THAT ARE ALLOWED FOR IN THE FREEDOM CAMPING ACT)?	No
OTHER COMMENTS	I believe this questions is another way of wording the question above.
8. DO YOU HAVE ANY ADDITIONAL COMMENTS?	From discussions with family members of the Hunter-Wilding Trust (previous landowners), the foreshore was never intended for camping. It was allocated for day use by the public, not overnight stays. In the late 1950s-1960s, the Trust subdivided the southern end of Akitio Beach, with the condition that the Trust would gift land for recreational use, this became the current camping ground. However, a critical mistake was made at that time: no caveat was placed on the land by the county to protect it from being sold commercially. The land gifted by the Trust was always meant for recreational purposes, i.e., a camping ground, not for the foreshore area. I respectfully ask the council to review relevant historical records and reconsider the inclusion of this area in the proposed

Introduction

The New Zealand Motor Caravan Association Inc. (NZMCA) welcomes the opportunity to submit on the Tararua District Council's Draft Freedom Camping Bylaw 2025. We are submitting this feedback via email, as the online submission form is currently unavailable. This submission builds on the preliminary stakeholder feedback we provided to Council on 11 April 2025.

The NZMCA represents over 121,000 New Zealanders who enjoy travelling the country at leisure in their certified selfcontained motorhomes and caravans. Our members are typically hybrid campers who love staying at commercial campgrounds, private campsites, and freedom camping areas. A 2025 survey of over 1,000 members found that 19% prefer freedom camping over all other forms of camping accommodation, and 52% consider freedom camping as part of their overall journey.

We acknowledge the Council's efforts to be welcoming and to manage freedom camping responsibly. The NZMCA also actively supports communities and local authorities in developing well-managed freedom camping areas that enhance both the visitor and resident experience (please see attached case studies).

However, we have significant concerns about the extent of prohibitions proposed in Schedule 1 and the legal and practical implications of certain bylaw clauses. These concerns relate to the proportionality, enforceability, and potential unintended consequences of the proposed restrictions.

Key concerns with the draft bylaw

Blanket prohibitions in 50–70 km/h zones

The proposed prohibition of freedom camping in all areas within 50–70 km/h zones across Norsewood, Dannevirke, Woodville, Pahiatua, Eketähuna, Ormondville, Herbertville, and Pongaroa is overly broad and lacks area-specific justification.

The High Court in NZMCA v Marlborough District Council [2021] confirmed that local authorities must undertake genuine site assessments to justify prohibitions under section 11(2) of the Freedom Camping Act 2011 (FCA). Blanket or extensive prohibitions without such assessments risk being ultra vires. To the best of our knowledge the Council has not undertaken these township assessments.

Dannevirke, Woodville, and Pahiatua are designated Motorhome Friendly Towns (MHFTs). The proposed prohibitions may force NZMCA to reconsider their MHFT status, as one of the agreed criteria is to be generally permissive towards responsible freedom camping.

Recommendations on specific clauses

Clause 5.3(d) - noise restrictions

This clause requires campers to comply with noise limits recorded in the District Plan. These limits are complex, vary across different zones and sites, and are difficult for visitors to interpret. It seems unfair to impose a \$400 infringement fine on campers who may unknowingly breach technical noise thresholds that are not clearly signposted or easily accessible online. **Recommendation:** Delete Clause 5.3(d). Council retains powers under the Resource Management Act 1991 to manage excessive noise more effectively.

Clause 5.3(m) – officer discretion on nuisance

This clause allows enforcement based on an officer's opinion of "nuisance," which is vague and risks arbitrary enforcement. It also appears inconsistent with the explanatory note in section 1.3 of the draft bylaw and the High Court's findings in NZMCA v QLDC [2024].

Recommendation: Delete or significantly revise Clause 5.3(m) to ensure clarity and fairness.

Temporary closures – Clause 10
Clause 10 allows the Council to temporarily close areas but lacks a definition of "temporary" and clear criteria for reopening. **Recommendations:** Amend Clause 10 so that the Council must

- Confirm any decision made under Clause 10 is consistent with section 11 of the FCA, that it is the most appropriate and proportionate way of addressing the perceived problem in relation to that area, and that it is consistent with the New Zealand Bill of Rights Act.
- Define the affected area either by a map or description of its locality.
- Give appropriate notice to the public and key stakeholders, including a timeframe and criteria to be met for the temporary closure or restriction to be lifted.

The NZMCA does not oppose temporary prohibitions *per se*. We acknowledge why these decisions may be necessary, provided they are made consistent with section 11 of the FCA and the Bylaws Act 1910. However, Clause 10 does not define "temporary". If the Council exercises its authority under Clause 10 beyond "temporary" (i.e. the prohibition is not timebound and/or offers no criteria to be met for it to be lifted), the decision could be challenged on the basis it is *ultra vires* because it is not truly temporary.

Support for urban freedom camping

Many NZMCA members prefer to freedom camp within urban areas and town centres where they support local businesses (see attached for examples). Prohibiting freedom camping in these areas undermines the social and economic benefits that responsible campers bring to local communities.

Recommendation: Review Schedule 1 to allow freedom camping in selected urban and township areas, and ensure prohibitions are supported by site-specific assessments.

General recommendations

- 1. Adopt Clause 5.2(b) to permit freedom camping where allowed by other legislation.
- 2. Retain Clause 5.3(a) allowing up to 5 nights in any 30-day period.
- 3. In accordance with Section 11 of the FCA, ensure all prohibitions and restrictions are:
 - Necessary to protect the area, health and safety, or access;
 - The most appropriate and proportionate response to the problem;
 - Consistent with the NZ Bill of Rights Act 1990.

Conclusion

The NZMCA supports responsible regulation of freedom camping. However, the Draft Bylaw, as currently proposed, imposes excessive and potentially unlawful restrictions. We urge the Council to revise the bylaw to ensure compliance with the FCA, uphold the rights of responsible campers, and support local economic activity.

We welcome the opportunity to engage further with Council on these matters.

Kiwis helping Kiwis

NZMCA supporting communities to help fund freedom camping initiatives.

Responsible freedom camping not only offers a fun, and family friendly way to enjoy the best of our unique country, it also benefits surrounding communities as campers spend locally on food, activities, and holiday souvenirs. But even bigger benefits are gained when freedom camping sites complement and enhance other recreational activities in the area.

As part of its commitment to supporting New Zealand's motorhome friendly communities, the NZMCA has recently supported a number of local authorities around New Zealand to help fund the development and enhancement of freedom camping sites.

A treat for trailblazers

The scenic 197km Hauraki Rail Trail cycle track runs from Matamata to Kaiaua and is a popular drawcard for motorhomers from all over New Zealand. The trail comprises five sections, with the most recent addition being the 10km extension that connects the trail from Pūkorokoro Miranda to Kaiaua.

A key part of completing the extension has been an overnight parking area for freedom campers starting the trail in Kaiaua. "We wanted to create a pleasant destination to stay in, not just a toilet stop," says Hauraki Council Community Development Advisor (Economic), Rebecca Jenks. "So we contacted the NZMCA and talked through the possibility of having some co-funding provided to help create a great parking area for motorhomers," she says.

"Prior to this, we'd applied to the Tourism Infrastructure Fund for funding toward the project. They are always keen to see that you've exercised all opportunities for co-funding. Our council unfortunately had a very low amount of co-funding that we could pull together for the project, so having the NZMCA come on board was really positive and helped us secure that additional funding from central government."

The NZMCA provided \$10,000 of funding which was used to help install an improved surface on the parking area, bollards, rubbish bins, cold showers, and landscaping appropriate for the coastal environment. "Initially the plan was to have just a very basic surface and a toilet block, but the funding has allowed us to make the site more attractive and somewhere that is enjoyable to stay in," says Rebecca.

"Our members live in these areas too and so we're always open to supporting tourism initiatives that offer tangible benefits to the community too" says NZMCA National Manager – Property and Policy, James Imlach.

"Projects such as this help to actively revitalise and regenerate the local environment which in turn has a positive impact on local communities."

With a new NZMCA member site opening in Kaiaua soon, it's obvious that motorhomers have a desire to make the most of the region and all it has to offer. "This site will help cater for that demand and take the pressure off other busy sites like Ray's Rest."

Rebecca says she was surprised at how straightforward it was to apply for funding from the NZMCA. "They've been very supportive and helpful. I'd strongly recommend that other local authorities looking for funding for similar projects get in touch with the NZMCA."

"We have stayed here a few times ... a good spot that has done us well - parking for plenty of vehicles, easy access for big rigs. Has a rubbish bin." – Paul, Whangamata, January 2022.

Barbecues by the bridge

With its beautiful West Coast landscape and a range of activities for all seasons, Greymouth is a popular spot for motorhomers to visit, and in fact was the NZMCA's first official Motorhome Friendly Town in the South Island.

A popular freedom camping spot in Greymouth is alongside Cobden Bridge, but with the area often becoming muddy, it was common for motorhomes to become stuck and require help to be pulled out.

When the local council recently reviewed its freedom camping bylaws, Engagement and Policy Facilitator Penny Kirk reached out to NZMCA National Manager – Property and Policy, James Imlach for advice.

"James was extremely supportive in helping us look at ways to update our bylaw, and during that conversation the NZMCA offered funding toward improving the **Cobden Bridge freedom camping site,**" she says.

The NZMCA provided \$5000 to help upgrade the area with suitable surfacing that would provide allweather parking for all motorhomers. The parking spot accommodates around 20 motorhomes and is located within easy walking distance to supermarkets, cafes, and restaurants. "It was an amazing experience dealing with the NZMCA," says Penny. "As an outside organisation, they were very willing to collaborate and work with us for the betterment of the area which is just awesome."

As well as upgrading the parking area, the NZMCA also contributed \$10,000 of funding to the Lions Club project to build a community shelter and a barbecue at the site. The project was spearheaded by Lions Club Greymouth member John Rothery.

"We'd heard about the NZMCA from a friend who is a member and thought they might be keen to get involved with upgrading the area," says John. "Motorhomers staying nearby would often be towing a boat and going off fishing, so I thought wouldn't it be great to have a barbecue where they could cook up their catch afterwards?" he says.

"I couldn't believe the fantastic response we got," says John. "I spoke with James about the project and he got the ball rolling very quickly. And the good thing was once they had contributed, it made it much easier to approach others too."

"Good spot, dogs ok. 10 min walk into town, 30 min walk along the stopbank to the river mouth and beach. Very little traffic noise overnight. Thanks GDC, very well kept area." – Ann, Tauranga, March 2022

"Stayed for 2 nights, lovely and quiet most of the time. PDS as you enter the area with fresh water and good rubbish disposal facilities." – Gordon, Waipukurau.

This feedback is made on behalf of Fire and Emergency New Zealand (**Fire and Emergency**) to Tararua District Council (**TDC**) on the Draft Tararua District Reserves Management Plan (**TDRMP**).

1. Background:

The principal objective of Fire and Emergency is to reduce the incidence of unwanted fire and the associated risk to life and property. Fire and Emergency seeks to:

- protect and preserve life,
- prevent or limit injury,
- prevent or limit damage to property and land, and
- prevent or limit damage to the environment.

Fire and Emergency's main functions, under the Fire and Emergency New Zealand Act 2017 (the FENZ Act) are:

- (a) to promote fire safety, including providing guidance on the safe use of fire as a land management tool; and
- (b) to provide fire prevention, response, and suppression services; and
- (c) to stabilise or render safe incidents that involve hazardous substances; and
- (d) to provide for the safety of persons and property endangered by incidents involving hazardous substances; and
- (e) to rescue persons who are trapped as a result of transport accidents or other incidents; and
- (f) to provide urban search and rescue services; and
- (g) to efficiently administer this Act.

Fire and Emergency has an interest in the fire management provisions of the TDRMP to ensure that appropriate consideration is given to fire and wildfire prevention and/or mitigation on public conservation land in the district.

2. Fire and Emergency's feedback is:

Section 3.3.7 of the TDRMP relates to 'Events and Firework Displays' and states that event organisers must seek *"prior permission from Fire and Emergency"* to hold a fireworks display (Policy 7).

There is a distinction between 'fireworks' and 'pyrotechnic' displays under the Health and Safety at Work (Hazardous Substances) Regulations 2017. Pyrotechnics, rather than fireworks, are generally used for public displays at major events, at any time of year, and require handlers to be WorkSafe certified. Fireworks contain no more than 40g of propellant and are generally used by private citizens.

It is assumed that the reference to fireworks displays under Policy 7 is likely to meet the definition of a 'pyrotechnics display'.

Whilst Fire and Emergency has a function in the approval process for pyrotechnics displays, which is administered by WorkSafe, Fire and Emergency is not the 'approver'.

As such, it is requested that Section 3.3.7 is updated to correctly reference the relevant approval process and regulator for such displays.

Notwithstanding the above, section 52 of the FENZ Act allows Fire and Emergency to prohibit or restrict activities in an area, including access to that area, that Fire and Emergency considers may cause a fire to start or to spread, during a prohibited or restricted fire season. This would include the use of fireworks and pyrotechnics, as these are considered 'activities'. It may be beneficial to include this as an advice note within the TDRMP for persons or handlers seeking to carry out such activities on reserve land within the district.

If you have any queries relating to Fire and Emergency's functions in relation to fireworks and pyrotechnic displays or reserve management generally, please do not hesitate to contact the local risk reduction team for the Hawkes' Bay District (contact: Nigel Hall, Community Risk Manager – **Exercise 19**).

Overall opinion of the draft Tararua District Council Reserve Management Plan

The Boards overall opinion of the plan is that of support – taking into consideration the extensive nature and complexity of reserves in the District.

The Board makes comment on the following -

Recreational Use Policies 3.3

Reserves are very much provided for the use and enjoyment of the general public – however the District currently is not meeting its requirements in making some of these areas safe –

E.g. Currently the Mangatoro – Ngapaeruru scenic reserve is being promoted as a reserve of significance when it clearly is unsafe to walk due to lack of maintenance of the tracks and felled trees.

This particular issue has been brought to the attention of the Board and Council but little has been done to rectify to date.

The Umutaoroa Board is also keen to make changes to their reserve with upgrades to the grounds which currently do not meet safety standards with the unsafe building and issues with trees.

The Board would like to see more assistance given to caretakers of these reserves to ensure their safety- the Board also recognises the constraints on finances for such projects but suggests that assistance maybe able to be given to develop plans in other areas to rectify these issues.

Walkways in Dannevirke – Smith – Adelaide Roads and Victoria Avenue.

The previous Dannevirke Community Board had the initiative and foresight to develop walkways in these areas to make walking safer for walkers whose numbers were increasing at the time. The majority of funds to develop these paths were obtained from donations and grants from a variety of trusts and organisations with very little financial input from Council. The Community Board of the day had been given an assurance that these paths would be maintained by council in the future – to date maintenance has been minimal and they are currently in need of substantial refurbishment.We are seeing more people walking on the road which is clearly unsafe as this is a 70kmp road.
